"Gary Morse started visiting Kimble Lake in the summer of 1991, spending time with the Weber family on Keller Road. Gary instantly fell in love with the lake and all it had to offer, so much so that he bought a fishing boat in the summer of 1992 just so he could trailer it to fish on Kimble Lake. If the Webers weren't there on a weekend, it was okay because Gary had a key to the facilities! Garv and Gloria became regular Kimble visitors after that until July of 1995, when they bought their own place on Keller Road from Merle and Donna Sprague. After that, it was rare to not see a light at the Morse's.

While most Kimble residents will recall those things about Gary, many don't realize that he is most remembered as the "Supervisor of Keller Road". His experience with everything – from his military service to air traffic control, from database design to building experimental airplanes – made him the most qualified for the job.

It often ended up that Gary would complete the project himself. For this and for so many other reasons, Garv will be missed.

He has left us with a lifetime of fond memories."





We Love Our Loon-y Tunes

Have you ever met a Minnesotan who didn't treasure the sights and sounds of loons? We often mention their signature calls when we describe the beauty of our lakes.

Loons have four different calls:

- The tremillo, or "crazy laugh", used to signal alarm and sometimes at night for defending territory;
- The *wail* sounds like a wolf howl and is used in social interaction between loons in a region to maintain contact with a mate;
- The hoot is used by family members to locate each other and check well-being; and

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Hundreds Attend Hearings on Pipeline

The Minnesota Public Utilities Commission has been hearing public testimony at five hearings across the state on the all-new Enbridge Energy Sandpiper pipeline, set to run from Beaver Lodge, N.D. to Superior, WI.

The proposed pipeline route would travel through the lakes area, just north of Crow Wing County. The entire pipeline would be approximately 612miles in length, 24-inches in diameter from the company's Beaver Lodge Station south of Tioga, North Dakota to Clearbrook, Minnesota and 30inches in diameter from Clearbrook to Superior, Wisconsin.

This recent round of hearings was intended to focus primarily on the need for the new pipeline, both Enbridge's need to serve its customers (oil companies) and Minnesota's need for economic development.

Proponents highlight the pipeline's proposed economic impact. According to Enbridge, the project would bring an additional \$25 million in property taxes to the 13 counties affected by the pipeline. An estimated 1,500 jobs would be created by the project.

Opponents, however, say that forgoing financial benefits is a small price to pay for keeping our lakes and land from being damaged beyond repair by construction and potentially polluted by oil spills.

Enbridge announced in September that the pipeline wouldn't be ready until at least 2017, a year later than the company's original estimate. And that's assuming it gets PUC approval, with a final PUC decision on Sandpiper's certificate of need expected in June.

Public comment is still open until 4:30 p.m. Jan. 23. Comments must be received by deadline and can be sent by mail to 121 Seventh Place E. Suite 350, St. Paul, Minn., 55101. Comments also can be submitted online at mn.gov/puc under the "Comment on an Issue" button.





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Loon-y Tunes (continued)

 The yodel, given only by the male, is a long, rising call with repetitive notes and can last up to six seconds. Yodels almost always occur when a male is in a tense interaction with an intruder that has landed (or is flying over) his territory. They convey information about the loon's fighting capabilities through the frequency of the strongest amplitude.
